Attendance

Thank you for your continued support with your child's attendance. We continue to be proud of our school's attendance figures and that Nonsuch is a place where students want to attend and learn

As we begin a new term we'd like to remind you of our Attendance policy regarding absences during the first and last week of terms. If your child is unwell during these weeks, we kindly ask for medical evidence to authorise the absence. The Government recommends that children with mild respiratory illnesses, such as a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat, can typically attend school. Physics success - Y13 and Y11

Physics Enrichment club for years 11-13 (plus a few keen Year 10s!) has been running fortnightly for the first two terms. Our main aim is to prepare for supra-curricular competitions.

British Physics Olympiad (A2 Competition)

For Y13, our impressive students were selected to enter the British Physics Olympiad. Every question is a real challenge for even the most capable. Congratulations to Ohemeaa, who achieved a Bronze certificate, Prakrti and Lara, who both achieved Silver, and Sophie who scored Top Gold.

Sophie (pictured) writes: "I participated, along with other physics students, in the British Physics Olympiad Round 1, which consists of two papers, one short answers and the other longer problems. Having achieved a top score in this, I was invited to participate in Round 2 of both the physics and astrophysics Olympiads. Both of these contained some fascinating problems, including the appearance of the sun on Discworld and how planes fly. I then went to a training camp in Oxford to practice and develop my skills further, where I met other avid physicists." Well done, Sophie!





Intermediate Physics Competition (GCSE competition)

Some Y11 students were invited to participate in the IPC (GCSE) We want them to use this opportunity to push themselves in Physics and every single one of our students who entered got a medal position! Senior Physics Olympiad

All Y12 physics students were given the opportunity to participate in the SPC and they really rose to the occasion. This competition is specifically to raise the game for students so they can tackle tough problems with confidence and gain an appreciation for how such problems are approached. We are impressed with our wonderful students who have broken Nonsuch records for their extraordinary haul of prizes.

There were over 40 Bronze certificates awarded which is a record not just because of the number of entrants, but also the proportion of our students achieving so highly compared to other schools. Ava Rose, Aree, Ashritha, Fiona, Jenelle, Keira, Marwa, Matt and Vishmayaa also will get book prizes along with their Silver certificates. Hats off to Yilin and Ibtida who achieved Gold medal certificates and will also get book prizes. We're proud to recognise your excellence!

Congratulations to all of our students who participated, in particular to Anisha, Navani, Fanxi, Dhriti (all Y11) and Vidula (Y10) who received the award of 'Best explanation' for the response, which included the interesting case study of the Bajau people who are able to hold their breath for up to 10 minutes at a time. The third round asks participants to pick the organisms in their local area which has the most incredible biology and explain why. We really look forward to seeing how our students do in this round. CCF Easter Camp

Freya (Y13) writes: "During the Easter holidays, 20 CCF cadets across Y11-13 embarked on a five-day expedition through the Pennines and Yorkshire Dales. Cadets powered through strong winds and rain and conquered the Yorkshire Three Peaks: Pen-y-Ghent, Ingleborough and Whernside, walking a total of just under 100km.

On Monday, we trekked from Buckden to Pen-y-Ghent and after camping in Settle overnight, we continued onto Ingleborough, which unlike last year, didn't present us with snow, but instead heavy winds and showers as we approached the peak.

Wednesday brought us to Whernside, the highest of the three peaks at 736m, then to Dent, a small village where we once again enjoyed a warm meal and camped overnight after a very soggy day of walking! The next day took us from Dent to Hawes and Hardraw Force Waterfall, England's largest single drop waterfall – its imposing views were definitely worth the long day of walking!

To end the week, cadets took part in the annual Tan Hill Challenge, a 10km race up to the Tan Hill Inn whilst carrying a minimum 10kg bag. This was the ultimate challenge to finish off a long week of walking and really pushed us to our limits, but the accomplishment of reaching the highest inn in Britain and enjoying some rewarding fish and chips was a great end to a demanding week!

This took place from March 11th to 22nd under the theme, "Accelerating the achievement of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls by addressing poverty and strengthening institutions and financing with a gender perspective". The UN Women UK CSW 68 is a two-week gathering government high-level NGO of officials. representatives, and UN delegates, alongside by grassroots numerous events organised organizations and activists. Participants discuss issues such as child marriage and equal pay, aiming to address progress and gaps in gender equality. At the conclusion. policy document with а recommendations for advancing women's rights is produced, which Member States collectively agree on and commit to implementing through action plans.
