Key questions	Why do Christians have such diverse beliefs and practices?

Ongoing Assessment	In lessons: Retrieval practice quiz at the beginning of each lesson, AFL such as use of mini whiteboards so students can hold up their responses, true/false statements that all students respond to (e.g. thumbs up/down)				
Key Assessment	An in class written assessment consisting of different formats of answer e.g. MCQ, short knowledge answers, and an evaluative paragraph				
·	A clear mark scheme will be used and students will have a student friendly version of the assessment criteria shared before the assessment.				
Clear sequencing of content	This topic follows a topic on the development of monotheism and one on Judaism. Students should be starting to draw parallels and make links between similarities between the faiths studied as well as noting differences and the reasons for these.				
	This topic will help students in the upcoming unit of Islam as they begin to make further connections between the Abrahamic faiths.				
Links to Careers	This topic provides students with excellent cultural capital as Christianity is a major world religion and has elements within much of modern culture.  Christian tradition has shaped many of the laws, values and ideals of the UK and as such secure knowledge of the tradition will assist students navigating later life.				
	Students may well be working with others of the Christian faith in the future and so their knowledge will contribute to an inclusive and tolerant workplace.				
Diversity and Inclusion	<ul> <li>We look at different interpretations of Christianity allowing students to see that the faith is inclusive of many perspectives and is not homogeneous</li> </ul>				
	We also look at how Christian festivals are celebrating differently in different cultures for example, Christmas around the world
