Skills Developed

- Listening, Speaking, Reading, Translating and Writing in Spanish
- A wider awareness of Spanish life and culture
- There will be written assessments throughout the year
- They will be graded according to the departmental marking policy, for homework and class work.

Topics covered

Personal information – Food and healthy diet – Shopping – Cinema, films and arranging to go out – Clothes and uniform – World of Work - Health and fitness, parts of the body, at the pharmacy and the doctor, an introduction to Hispanic festivals.

A glossary of key vocabulary is at the back of the text book

Grammar will include:

- Revision of present tense regular + irregular verbs
- Introduction to Immediate Future
- Infinitive structures
- Comparatives, Adverbs, object pronouns

Grammar is covered throughout the text book with useful verb tables at the back.

How we assess your daughter's progress

- There will be regular vocabulary and grammar tests, as well as end-of-unit assessments in one of these different skills: Writing, Listening, Reading and Speaking.
- Homework will be given after every lesson (20 minutes) and may be learning for a vocabulary test, or revising for an end-of-unit test, or may be a reading exercise or a short piece of writing.
- All creative writing assessments will be marked and your daughter will be given clear guidance on what she has done well and what she needs to do in order to improve.
- Progress of the class will be assessed during lessons and your daughter's teacher will adapt the lesson content according to the needs of the class.
