



Our KS3 Intent:

To empower our young people and enrich their lives to ensure they aspire to take their centre stage place in the world.

We want students to **enjoy learning**, to become independent and **effective learners** and to achieve academic success in an atmosphere that fosters positive relationships and mental health, promotes equality and celebrates diversity.

- Two-week timetable Week I and Week 2; 50 sixty-minute lessons a fortnight on their timetable
- Students taught in form groups; approx. 60% of Year 7 lessons taught in their form room base. The remaining 40% taught in subject specialist classrooms
- Science lessons encompass Physics, Biology and Chemistry
- Technology lessons encompass a carousel of Food, Textiles and DT
- All students study Latin and then a Modern Foreign Language
- In PE, two different activities are taught per half term. Over the year, students play a range of different sports which include, netball, hockey, health and fitness, gymnastics, dance, cricket, and tennis.



DEBITS






Accumulating debits:



SAFEGUARDING

All adults in school have a responsibility for safeguarding

MOBILE PHONE POLICY

EXPECTATIONS: UNIFORM

Key uniform requirements:

- Plain black shoes, no boots, or trainers
- Socks and tights should not be worn together
- Skirt worn on or below the knee
- No makeup or jewellery
- One pair small, **plain**, stud earrings is permissible
- Permissible jewellery must be removed for PE
- No facial piercings are allowed
- Our uniform policy can be accessed on the school website About Us/ Policies

Reasonable adjustments and exemptions can be made for medical reasons but written communication is needed

EXPECTATIONS: ATTENDANCE

Prompt communication on the day of absence via school gateway app

Schoolgateway

- Decision over whether planned absences are authorised rests with school
- Some absences are treated as authorised, such as medical appointments
- The school may ask for further evidence to justify an absence, such as doctor's note
- Holidays in school time will not be authorised
- It is expected that all students aim for at least 96% attendance each year
- Below 90% is defined as a serious cause for concern
- Attendance of 80% is equal to I day missed per week.
- If this continues from Years 7 to 11, a total of one year's education will be lost.

ENRICHMENT AND TRIPS


- We encourage all our students to attend at least one club a week.


