Learning outcome	<p>Final Outcome Students will draw and paint a landscape inspired by David Hockney.</p> <p>Subject Content Students will develop an understanding of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Elements of Photography: Identification of the focal point and the rule of thirds. • Mind Mapping a Concept: Identifying connections and developing a concept. • Impressionist Painting: Identifying texture, shadows, and applying En Plein Air techniques for observing colours. • David Hockney's Artwork: Exploration of his style and techniques. <p>Skill Set Students will develop the ability to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Take photographs applying the rule of thirds. • Identify the focal point in a composition. • Paint in layers to create texture and contrast.
Key Question	<p>Key questions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Why is the horizon line important? • How do we apply the rule of thirds in photography and composition? • What defines a focal point? • What are the main features of David Hockney's art style? • How can texture be created through colour? • How do you create a sense of depth in a landscape drawing?
Knowledge	<p>Key Concepts & Skills Development</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Photography Composition: Foreground, Middle ground, Background, Horizon line, Focal point. • Observational Drawing from Secondary Sources (Landscapes): Observation, Overlapping, Line, Shape, Proportion, Angles, Direction, Positive & Negative space, Recording, Texture, Accuracy, Details, Control. • Mind Mapping: Analysis of features and their interconnections. • Drawing and Painting: Proportions, Mark-making, Tone, Texture, Consistency, Colour. • Artist Analysis: Observation and identification of subject matter, genre, intentions, mood, inspiration, and formal elements in Hockney's work.



Ongoing Assessment	<p>Formative Assessment</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Peer and Group Assessment: Through whiteboard feedback and collaborative activities. • INT (I Need To) Self-Assessment: Reflecting on teacher feedback to guide student progress. <p>Key Misconceptions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Variability in shape recording. • Understanding and applying composition proportions. • Mark-making and controlling paint application. • Managing colour contrast. <p>Homework</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ELA (Extended Learning Activities): Assigned each term to deepen knowledge and understanding. • Tasks to be completed: Activities started in class, continuing as flipped classroom tasks. • Photo shoot of a local part in students' area.
Clear sequencing of content	<p>Rationale</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Personalised Response: Students will reflect on their own photographs to create a landscape drawing and painting inspired by David Hockney, adding their personal touch to the outcome. • Learning Extension: Students will extend their knowledge of landscape composition, enhance their mark-making techniques, and reinforce their painting skills. • Artist Inspiration: Exposure to Hockney, a contemporary British artist, helps students appreciate the landscape genre while exploring the diversity of artistic practices and themes. • Cultural Reflection: Through the lens of British sub-culture, LGBTQ+ representation, and the contrast with their own cultural heritage, students will better understand how art can reflect diverse identities and histories.

Challenge

Nonsuch Park En Plein Air

Students will visit Nonsuch Park to complete an *En Plein Air* (outdoor) sketching and painting challenge. Using their direct observation, they will apply the rule of thirds, identify a clear focal point, and capture the landscape using Hockney-inspired techniques. The challenge encourages students to explore colour, texture, and depth in a real-world setting, enhancing their observational and painting skills.
